

Emissions


To offset current **Carbon Dioxide**(CO₂) emissions from cremations in the UK, it is estimated it would require the planting of over 1 Million Trees...

Emissions



Nitrogen oxide (NOx) is a by-product of chemicals used in embalming and coffin construction and thermal NOx is generated from the process of combustion.

Nitrogen oxide (**NOx**) emissions from cremation in the UK alone is estimated at the equivalent of a car travelling <u>1.7 Billion km</u>



FBCA members shall endeavour to adhere to the following aims:

- C remation Authorities will comply with environmental legislation and seek continual improveme in environmental performance.
- operate processes in such a way as to minimise environmental impact
- M aximise the energy efficiency of crematoria and ancillary facilities.
- M anage, the procurement of goods and service ensuring sustainable sources are used wherever possible.
- mplement procedures and policies within the organisation, to minimise waste and improve pollution prevention control.
- Tanslate the environmental processes that have been implemented into a defined Environment Management System
- M onitor the environmental performance of suppliers and encourage and assist them to develop or improve upon their ethical and environmental policies through partnership working.
- E neourage employees at all levels within the organisation to take ownership for good environment Practice
- N rominate a named individual to champion environmental stewardship throughout the Cremation Authority and be responsible for environmental oversight.
- hrough regular meetings and good communications encourage the active participation of key stakeholders, including the bereaved, funeral directors and local politicians, to support the delivery of environmental improvements.

The Funeral Director's Perspective



- The role of the funeral director is to discuss, organise and deliver a funeral according to the wishes of their client/family.
- Environmental concerns take a secondary place to choice and personalisation with many families.





- Vehicles
- Coffins and fittings (emissions)
- Care of deceased, embalming, formaldehyde, implants, amalgam, modern treatments. TCU areas and operation
- Flowers.
- Burial/ cremation and alternatives
- Headstone material and ethical sourcing. (Supply chain)





- Tradition still Influences the majority of funerals.
- Inertia in some parts of the Sector
- No imperative for voluntary change. Change only where legislation requires it.
- Manufacturing and suppliers
- Formaldehyde free fluids
- Resomation. Reuse of graves.
- More use of standard vehicles in ceremonial process.
- Sources of energy for funeral homes and care centres
- Use of native materials for memorials. Memorial re use.
- Market disruption- Technology and on-line opportunities
- Changing choice- Direct cremation and celebration of a life events.




DEPOT & GLASSHOUSE
